

How Accurate Are The Canadian Firearms Centre Records?

On December 20th, 2001 an NFA member called the Canadian Firearms Centre at 1-800-731-4000 and asked for a list if all firearms owned by him as of that date. He gave call centre employee his name, license number and postal code.

Much to his surprise, he was told that he did not own any firearms. He explained to the lady that her information was obviously incorrect, and would she please check again.

She did, with the same results. She then asked for the postal code of his previous address. He gave her the postal code, and after a brief wait, the call centre voice replied happily that he owned a total of four firearms, apparently rifles.

Again, our NFA member explained that this was in error, and that she should check again. After yet another wait, she replied that she could find no other firearms registered to him.

“So, how do I find out the actual list of firearms registered to me, since you obviously cannot find the correct information?” he asked.

“You will have to file an Access To Information Request, sir.”

“Would you please mail me the correct form to use for this request?”

“I am very sorry sir, but I cannot send you the form. We do not have any. I can tell you the number of the form and where you should mail it to though.”

And she did. After obtaining a form from the internet, our NFA member filled it out and mailed it off. As of February 8, 2002 he is still waiting for a response to that request.

What Every Firearms Owner Should Do

1. Every person who owns one or more firearms, registered or not, should file an access to information request with the federal government to see exactly what they think he/she owns.
2. Copies of the access to information request should be forwarded to Canadian Alliance MP Garry Breitkreuz. If/when you receive a response, a copy of that should also be forwarded to Mr. Breitkreuz. He is the Alliance MP who is championing the cause of firearms owners. This information can help him bring the insanity of the government's firearms registration system to light.

A copy of the form is attached to this letter. Simply fill in the blanks, and mail it to the Justice Department. Under current law, they have 30 days to respond to your request. If they have not responded to you within the required time, write them again, asking for the results if your inquiry.

Access to Information Request Form

Step 1

Determine which federal government institution is most likely to have the information you are seeking. Decide whether you wish to submit an informal request for the information or a formal request under the *Access to Information Act*. If you wish to make an informal request, contact the appropriate institution. The address can likely be found in *Info Source* publications which are available across Canada, generally in major public and academic libraries, constituency offices of federal Members of Parliament and most federal government public enquiry and service offices.

Step 2

To apply for information under the *Access to Information Act*, complete this form or a written request mentioning the Act. Describe the information being sought and provide any relevant details necessary to help the institution find it. If you require assistance, refer to *Info Source (Sources of Federal Government Information)* for a description of program records held by the institution or contact its Access to Information Coordinator.

Step 3

Forward the access request to the Coordinator of the institution holding the information. The address is listed in the "Introduction" to *Info Source*. Enclose a \$5.00 money-order or cheque payable to the Receiver General of Canada. Depending upon the type or amount of information being sought, you may be asked to authorize further charges.

Step 4

When you receive an answer to your request, review the information to determine whether you wish to make a further request under the Act. You also have the right to complain to the Access to Information Commissioner should you believe that you have been denied any of your rights under the Act.
